Rearing of Pheasants and ducks for big shoots on the big estates gave employment to many people. Lord Ashbrook had four game keepers at one time.

Major Stubber employed two, Lord Castletown four men. They lived in little houses on the estates so as to afford greater protection for the birds, and their work consisted of rearing the birds from the egg stage. Hens would be purchased from local farmers for hatching, then the young birds would be fed on hard boiled eggs.

Ducks were reared at a place known to this day as "The duck pond" situated on Gay Lalor's farm. By late f ther told me a story which went like this. Lady Ashbrook was witching the duck swim around the pond one day, when she noticed some duck going under water and not coming up again, so she reported it to the gamekeeper. He opened the sluide gate and drained the pond, and there to his surprise was a huge pike fish, the largest ever seen in this area. He was five feet long, fed a 11 his life on duck. He was on show in Flanagan's Hardware window for a long time, and I believe people came from allower the country to see him.

First Aid Port 2

In the last issue of the Newsletter we dealt with the aims of First-id, we also wrote of the priorities which a person competent in First aid should learn to deal with - Breathing, Bleeding and Unconsciousness.

Breathing We must be able to breath in order to live. The wind and air passages must be clear. The mouth sust be lear of obstructions and foreign bodies., Myou must check that the casualty is not in danger of swallowing his tongue: This applies particularly to an unconscious canualty whose tongue can easily block the wind pipe. This can be prevented by tilting the head right back. Check for breathing by listening to his mouth or nose, and by looking at his chest and abdomen for a rising and falling movement. If breathing has stopped-apply artificial (mouth to mouth respiration) or the kiss of live.
