Of course sugar isn't held in the same high esteem as years ago. I'm thinking perhaps that neighbours aren't either.

Recently I bumped into an old school friend whom I hadn't seen in years. For the past seven years he has been living in an estate in a typical midlands town. When I asked him how he got on with his neighbours he fairly shocked me by saying that he really didn't know any of them.

I personally found this difficult to relate to due to my own background where our neighbours and ourselves practically lived in each others ears.

What's happening at all I wonder? Is it possible that we're working so hard that we haven't the time to get to know our neighbours? Or have we become so hardened, so insular, so impersonal that we don't actually WANT to get to know them?

I also find it somewhat ironic that one of our most popular T.V. shows should be called "Neighbours" while, round about us, the true meaning of neighbour-liness. "neighbours are just good friends" - is rapidly vanishing.

Neighbours, I'm beginning to think, should be a preserved species. Because if we're not careful, like the poor old Dodo, they'll be extinct.
