HISTORICAL SNIPPET

Many changes have taken place in this area in the last fifty or sixty years. Durrow Brick Co., once employed thirty-four men. The brick yard was located beside Attanagh railway station so that Durrow Brick could be transported by rail to every corner of the country, and as a result places like the Curragh and many fine brick buildings in Dublin are built with Durrew Bricks.

The clay was mined in Tinweir and transported by overhead cable buckets. But alas this great industry is gone. A great mystery surrounds its closing. Experts say the clay is the finest in Europe.

Durrow Mills comes to mind, once a wonderful source of employment. Lord Ashbrock employed over seventy people.

Then building by concrete blocks started. The late Joe Brophy built up a fine industry, Castle Concrete Works, employing forty-five of a staff. Joe's firm was purchased by a firm who have since moved out of Durrow.

It's a pity fine industries have to go in the ever changing world we live in.
