FIRST AID You are almost certain at sometime in your life, to come up against emergencies calling for immediate on the spot assist ace - this is known the state of the state of as First lid.

First Aid is the first help a casualty receives. The name indicates that there is more to follow - qualified treatment given by a person such as a doctor or nurse etc.

Some of the accidents will be minor, and you may be able to treat them your self. Where they are more serious you should not try to do more than is absolutely essential. You may unknowingly make a simple injury fracture worse, while intending to do good.

The aims of First aid are - to save lives - to treat injuries so that they will improve and to relieve pain and distress - to get the casualty to hospital or to a doctor as quickly as possible.

What should I do first? Assess the situation. Speed is essential if lives are to be saved: so quickly,

1. Check if the casualty is Breathing. If not apply artificial respiration.

- 2. Check for Severe Bleeding. Stop blood flow by direct pressure on the
- 3. Check if the casualty is breathing but <u>Unconscious</u>. Turn to recovery position.
 4. Deal with bad wounds or serious burns.
- 4. Deal with bad wounds or serious burns.
- 5. Provent movement of suspected fructured or dislocated bones.

 6. Get casualty to hospital for observation and treatment.

- 7. Look after Yourself you don't want to become another casualty.
- 8. Remove the casualty from direct danger of further injury, breathing, severe bleeding, unconsciousness. Whatever the injuries send someone for the doctor atc. at the earliest 8. Remove the casualty from direct danger of further injury, breathing, qualified help by calling an ambulance, doctor etc. at the earliest possible opportunity.
 - Do Not leave the casualty until help arrives.
