Christmas Cake

1 lb Flour 4 ozs Cherries 4 ozs Whole Almonds 12 ozs Marg. 12 ozs Brown Sugar 4 ozs Ground Almonds 8 Eggs 1 lb Raisins 1 teaspoon Mixed Spice 1 lb Sultanas Pinch of Salt 2 lb Currants 4 ozs Mixed Peel 1 Apple, grated ½ glass Whiskey or Brandy Grated Rind of one Lemon

ME THOD

- 1. Sieve together flour, salt, spice, gro nd almonds and lemon rind.
- 2. Chred whole almonds, quarter the cherries.
- 3. Clean the fruit, chon the peel and combine with shredded almonds, cherries and grated apple. 4. Beat the eggs and add them to the spirits.
- 5. Cream butter and sugar.
- 6. Add the eggs, a little at a time, and beat thoroughly and lightly into the creamed mixture. Care must be taken in adding the last of the eggs, or the mixture may curdly. To prevent curdling add a little of the flour mixture before adding the last of the eggs.
- 7. Now fold in very lightly the flour mixture.
- 8. Lastly stir in the fruit.

Prepare a 10" round tin by lining the bottom and sides with two thicknesses

of greaseproof paper. Put the misture into the prepared tin and bake $5\frac{1}{4}$ hours in a Mod. Slow oven $(300^{\circ}-325^{\circ}-\text{Reg. 2})$ N.B. Set tin in the middle

of the oven. Allow cake to cool in tin before removing it.

Store in a cool, dry place until about two weeks before Christmas when the Almond Icing may be put on. If an extra rich cake is desired, now and again during the storing period, make a few holes in the top of the cake with a skewer or knitting needly and trickle in a teaspoonful of whiskey or brandy.

Happy baking. This recipe has been tried and tested by numerous people.

You may remember that the first Protestant Church was built in 1731 and from that date a building was erected here to serve as a Catholic Church. It probably had a thatched rood. It was later replaced by the present building. It has a peculiar filling between the stones instead of mortar. It is a mixture of "colm". This came from the Castlecomer colleries and is the slack of antthracite. When the sun shines on it there is a glistening effect.

There is a cross on the gate and the street is Sraid an tSeipeil. While digging in this area some years ago bones were found. Probably there was a cemptery there. The building has a Preservation Order on it.

Leaving this building we proceed down to Patrick Street on the main Dublin Cork road. Turning right we come to what was the P.P.'s house and is now the Curates. The Curate's house was across the road but there is not a stone of that building left. That wonderful man Canon Carrigan for periods lived in both houses. I was sorry I had not the pleasure of knowing him. We would have had some common interests.

Canon Carrigan was born in Rothestown, Mucklee, Co. Kilkenny. He was the youngest of thirteen - eleven boys and two girls. His parents were native speakers and he was prowd his grandmother spoke only Irish.

He went to the local school and then to St. Kierans. He was ordained by Dr. Moran in the Presentation Convent, Kilkenny in 1834. After two years as Professor in St. Kierans he was appointed C.C. in Ballyragget where he remained for 5 years. Then Conahy 2 years, Templeorum 2 years and finally Durrow in 1897 where he remained for the rest of his life, 12 years as Curate and 15 years as P.P.

From the time of his ordination he took an active interest in history and archoeology. While still in Ballyragget Bishop Brownrigg asked him to w rite a history of the Diocese of Ossory.

He started writing his history of Ossory in 1897 and finished it in 1903. He wrote it all in the then P.P.'s house in Durrow by the light of two candles and no fire in the room Winter or Summer. It consists of four volumes and is considered one of the best of any diocesan history in Ireland.
