Each day he had to trim the wick and fill the lamps with oil. Lightening time was governed by the time of year. The lamps were located as follows: - on the wall of Bornie McLoughlin's Patrick Street (the Gallows Hill), Scotts Corner, Mahoneys shop, Gay Lalors, Sean Clancy's, Keenans Shop, Market House (now Alleys Drapery), Castle Gates, M. Graces (R.I.C. Barracks) Joe Murphys (The Ted Lion Hotel) and on the Bridge. John Cashin The Bridge Bar has one of these lamps and will soon have it erected in the original position on the Bridge.

Durrow was eaten that year by one mark for first place. Rathvilly were the winners. The local I.C.A. did trojan work. As a matter of interest it was the I.C.A. that started the Tidy Towns in Durrow.

We now come to the Manor House known as Castle Durrow home of the Flower Family. They became Ashbrooks with the title of Viscount.

Some years back I consulted the Knights of Glin regarding the building of Durrow Castle. He is a famous architect and an authority on the big houses. He informed me that the a ctual building of Castle Durrow is the most completely documented domestic building in Ireland. In the first half of the I8th century all the building accounts are fully set out in Cannon Carrigan's note books. These are in the National Libra ry.

As we approach the Convent Avenue we see another entrance on our left. This is for the Primary School. This is a lovely modern building with lovely surrounding la ndscaping. Both tea chers and pupils are very fortunate to be working in such a building. There is one person to whom the Durrow people will always be indebted and that is the late Sister Mary Bowe. She was a great friend of ours and on one occasion I suggested to her that we should have an Irish Hymn now and then at Mass. The result was that we had one every Sunday. We have some beautiful hymns in Irish.

Now a brief account of some of the Ashbrooks. Sir George Flower and English Officer, came to Iroland in the reign of Elizabeth I. accompanied by IOO soldiers. His son Sir William came to Dunrow in 1664. He rented a house from the Duke of Ormond. His son another William got the title of Viscount Ashbrook. He built the present building in 1716.

There is a bit of romance attached to the 2nd Viscount. In England on the Thames there is a ferry crossing. A girl once operated this ferry. She was Betty Rudge, the ferrymans daughter. The Rudges were of humble stock.
